William Long, Pioneer Here, Died Tuesday

RESIDENT OF PORT TOWN-SEND FOR 45 YEARS PASSED AWAY SUDDENLY.

Another old settler of Port Townsend, William Long, answered his final summons at his home Tuesday evening of this week when he succumbed to a heart attack about 7:30 o'clock. He had not been in the best of health and had planned to retire the first of the year from his work as janitor of the First National Bank. On the evening of his death he had eaten his supper as usual and felt no intimation of his going.

William Long was born in Ontario, Canada, September 26, 1864. He came to Port Townsend forty-five years ago from Ontario. He worked for several years for Hengry Bayley in his transfer business, as a driver. Giving up this work

as a driver. Giving up this work he was then in the employ of John Siebenbaum for twenty years. At the end of that time he went on the Port Townsend police force where he worked for four years. This was followed by two years in a local ice plant. For the past 7½ years he has been employed by the First National Bank of Port Townsend as janitor.

He married Mrs. Matilda oft thirty-five years ago, at which time he built the home near Chetzemoka Park where they have lived since that time.

He leaves his widow, Mrs. Matilda Long, a brother John Long in Ontario, and other more distant relatives. Of these two nieces. Mrs. O. F. Austin of Port Angeles and Mrs. A. B. Hatt of Lowell, Wash., are here with Mrs. Long during her bereavement. Mrs. Harry Hart of Seattle, an old friend of the family, is also at the Long home this week.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 o'clock this morning at the Port Townsend Mortuary with the Port Townsend aerie of Eagles in charge, with Chaplain Frank A. Danzer officiating. The remains will be taken to Seattle for cremation and the ashes will later be brought here for interment in Laurel Grove Cemetery.
